As we head into December we are all hoping for snow. By the time you read this I hope we have plenty of the white stuff so we can enjoy our winter sports of snowshoeing, x-country skiing and snowmobiling in the park. If you're reading this and there is no snow please start your snow dance. Even though winter can be stressful from a lot of snow, with all the fall colors gone we can probably all agree that some pretty white snow would be a nice addition to our beautiful park.

I had a good turn out for the first basic snowshoeing class without any snow! We learned about snowshoes, tried them on and then went for a hike without snowshoes. The Heber Valley Christmas Bird Count was also a success. We had 14 people monitoring our precious "flighted" creatures in the valley. The unofficial count is 2,480 birds and 47 species. Stay tuned for future opportunities to participate in citizen science projects in the park. Also check the Friends website for upcoming winter programs.

We are looking forward to the Crescent Moon and Stars hikes this winter with the Friends group. They normally do a full moon hike but this year they are trying something different since the full moon falls so close to the New Year. Come out and support the Friends under dark, star filled skies on Jan 27 and Feb 24.

Remember the upper trail on the Mountain Course will not be groomed or open for skiing or snowshoeing this year. Also the cross-country ski trails and the golf course is not open to snowshoeing. Snowshoe rentals are available in the visitor center and can be used in other areas of the park. Members of Friends are free of charge. Friends of Friends still pay the rate of \$6 for adults and \$3 for kids. Snowshoeing is a great way to get outside in the winter for exercise. If you are a cross-country skier, you can buy a day pass at the visitor center or pro shop. Adults are \$6 and kids are \$3.

Thanks to the Friends for a great Christmas party and also for supporting the Heber Valley Christmas Bird Count dinner on Dec 17th.

Winter Safety in Avalanche Country

Most people would be surprised to hear that avalanches would exist right now in our back country due to the very dry winter we've had to this point. Here we are in the middle of December and wondering when the storms are going to arrive. It would probably surprise most people as well, to know that Utah has had its first fatality in 2011 from an avalanche which occurred back in the middle of November. So how did this happen?

Utah typically receives snow storms starting in October, and sometimes as early as September. When these storms come, the snow will characteristically stay in the shady areas of the North facing slopes. This snow becomes very crusty and sugary due to the temperature changes that fluctuate that time of year. The problems arise when we start getting bigger storms in November and this sits on top of the weak layers of early snow. Once a person starts skiing or snowmobiling on these weak snow packs, avalanches can and will often occur.

A good way to understand an avalanche is as simple as thinking of the snow that sticks to your car windshield. When it is cold, the snow sticks to the windows slope and doesn't slide off. Once temperatures warm up a bit, the snow will start to slough off and often times in slabs. This is true for steep slopes in the mountains.

Some factors to be aware of that as a combination or individually can cause avalanches to occur are; snowfall, temperature, wind direction, snowpack conditions, terrain, slope angle and slope orientation. Most avalanches occur on slopes between 30 and 45 degrees, on slopes that are North, East and Northeast facing, in open areas where little vegetation is, and on slopes where the wind has loaded the opposing side of the ridge line (wind typically blows up hill and deposits snow from one side of the ridge onto the other side).

How do you know if the snow is safe? Short of cutting into a hill side and observing the layers everywhere you go, some things to look for and listen for are cracks in the snow, slabs separating from the hillside, or listen for "whumping" sounds that indicate the snow is settling in large areas underneath you.

Ideally, avoiding avalanche areas is far better than trying to survive one. The best practices to increase your odds of surviving include the following: Always wear an avalanche beacon and know how to use it. Always ride or ski with someone who has a beacon as well; it won't do you any good if you have one on and your potential rescuers don't. Always tell someone where you are going and when you will return home.

There are many more opportunities for you to be killed in the backcountry in the winter than just avalanches. When you go to the backcountry go with the intent to spend the night on the mountain. If you have this in your mind, then you will have made all the necessary preparations and taken all the necessary gear to keep yourself alive until your rescuers can find you.

We settled down in the Virginia suburbs of Washington D.C. Don spent his career in foreign affairs for the federal govt. I taught history and govt. in high school for ten years. We enjoy travel, photography, reading, the theater and political debate.

We have two children; a daughter born in Munich, Germany while we were there on assignment and a son, born in Georgetown, D.C. Our daughter, her husband and our two grand children live in the northern suburbs of Atlanta. Our grandchildren are both attending college in Atlanta. Our son lives in American Fork, Utah.

We retired and moved back to Utah in 1985. We "fell in love" with Heber Valley. We also got involved in civic activities, campaigning to save the Heber tabernacle, renovating the city park and various other volunteer activities in Heber and Salt Lake. These volunteer activities lead to my appointment by Gov. Leavitt, to the Utah State Parks Board in 1993. I was the first woman member of that board and served as chairman from 1995 to 1997. In that position I helped get the Olympic cross country skiing events for Soldier Hollow and served on the planning committee for that venue. I served on the State Parks Board until 2001 when I was appointed to the Utah Travel Council Board.

In planning for the Olympics we found that a "Friends" group would be very helpful for Wasatch Mountain State Park. The Friends of WMSP was established in 1999 as a 501-C-3 non-profit organization. Our goals were to preserve the historical significance of the park, protect the ecological integrity of the area, promote public awareness and education and develop recreational opportunities and awareness. A major activity was to raise money for park projects. Our first such effort was to raise money to re-build the Tate barn at Soldier Hollow for the Olympics. It was highly successful and we have since held golf tournaments, garage sales, dinner/silent auctions, and other events in raising money for projects such as trails, signage, landscaping, equipment, and educational brochures for the park. We sponsor hikes, snowshoeing events, social activities for members, etc. I think aiding the park in providing things for our visitors that cannot be done due to their ever-shrinking budget is one of our most important roles and much appreciated by the staff. We need to keep our overall goals in mind as we plan future activities.

Open Board Positions
